InterActionsLA - Inspiring Quality Transit Neighborhoods

With a focus on regional growth and equity, the Lewis Center launched its inaugural InterActions LA conference to discuss how sweeping, taxpayersupported investments in Los Angeles' transportation systems can address decades-old inequities.

InterActions LA paired the latest academic thinking with real-world examples of positive and progressive change at the community level. With so many diverse objectives - affordable housing, environmental concerns, access to opportunities, safety and security issues around mobility - the solutions will prove to be equally diverse.
